Article from Toby

Grace and peace and greetings to all of you at St Johns and P&P.

Ahead of my licensing in a couple of weeks' time, I have been granted access to the parish 'OneDrive' – the secure online storage/filing system set up by my predecessor Luke, which contains everything to do with church life – in other words, a veritable Pandora's box that I wasn't sure if I should open prior to starting. After some deliberation, I decided it might be helpful to login and have a quick scan through and familiarise myself with important documents like Sunday rotas. But the things that really piqued my interest were the photographs, and the historical treasures contained therein (such as the startling revelation that the vicarage garden used to be far bigger! We might have had more success getting the diocese to agree to installing a pool, hot tub, and sauna had we the same space!).

Looking at the parish of yesteryear and seeing the churches packed out with congregants dressed in their Sunday best, a youth choir, Sunday schools, garden parties and so on, served as a timely reminder that we stand on the shoulders of those who went before us in the faith. People have been praying and worshipping in this parish for the best part



of two centuries. And as we are all of us wrapped up in the mystical body of Christ, our

lives coinhere with theirs, we are – present and departed - a part of God's grand narrative, the story of ordinary lives lived in the extraordinary presence of God. Obviously, times have changed a great deal since the parish was first established. Our current cultural climate is increasingly suspicious of religious institutions (often for good reason, as recent events in the CofE have made plain), more and more people grow up with a nominal Christian heritage at best, zero biblical literacy, and little grasp of Jesus or the Gospel about him. As churches up and down the country are 'ageing out', we can no longer assume, as our forebears had the luxury of doing, that the majority of folks will just habitually attend their local church each Sunday.

However, while all these factors may seem to pose an insurmountable challenge for the life of the Church, these are nevertheless exciting times. For God has never ceased working in the world. History is simply the stage on which the Church is struggling to catch up with the ever-expanding boundaries of God's love. I believe that the Church's vocation to the world, is to make room for this activity, to *make room for Jesus* no less.



happened almost 60 years ago as the land was cleared to make room for P&P (it's notable that children were the first builders). The national Church – as with many other Christian denominations – is in a period of reckoning and decline for sure, but it's also been through a *fallow* period – one in which the land is cleared, and we let the it lie so that it may be the replenished, so that new life can take root. It feels fitting that my licensing should take place during the Church calendar's own 'fallow season', the great big purple ocean of sadness that we call "Lent", which prepares us to celebrate the mystery of Good Friday and Easter. Ahead of my licensing, and at the invitation of the Churchwardens, I will be taking the Ash Wednesday service next week (St John's, 10am)

This photo stood out among those I found. Not only is it a striking and beautiful composition, but I think it also serves us a wonderful image of this calling to make room for Jesus, which is precisely what



 I would love to see you there, as we step into this season together praying and asking God how we can each make more room for Jesus in our lives.

Just before Christmas, another 'image' struck me when I accepted the Bishop's offer to become the next Priest-in-charge of the parish. In Luke 1, a pregnant Mary goes to visit her relative Elizabeth, who despite her old age also has a miraculous "bun in the oven." It was customary in this culture for pregnant relatives to get together, to share the joys and burdens of pregnancy, and to serve as midwives to one another. But what struck me was this:

Elizabeth makes room in her home for Mary, just as Mary makes room to give birth to Jesus.

The Church has this vocation also, to make room for Jesus by acting as a midwife for the world. As your prospective parish priest, I feel like I am called to be an 'Elizabeth', making space for you through worship, community, and prayer so that Christ may be birthed in you (and I hasten to add, *vice versa*). The parish itself is a type of 'Elizabeth' too, a midwife of the Kingdom, who invites its neighbours in, creating a comfortable

space for them, so that Christ may be birthed in them, so that the Gospel come alive in them, and so that they might also experience His love, His grace, His peace, His freedom, His beauty, His goodness, and His truth, in and through their lives.

Hannah and I are so looking forward to getting to know you all in this next season of life. Truth be told, we are also nervous and apprehensive about what this next chapter holds for us as a family, but we are equally excited to see what God will do amongst us, in us, and through us as we join in God's adventure with you in the parish.

Unless I see you on Ash Wednesday I look forward to seeing you on 10th March. Much love,

Diocesan Family Support Work

Extract from recent newsletter from Family Support Team *Dear Friends,*

Our work continues to be hugely busy with many new referrals since the start of the year. There have been some very challenging situations, particularly regarding obtaining support for children with SEN where schools are reluctant to commit funding and resources. These cases take up a large amount of practitioners' time but when we are able to successfully secure support, make a lifechanging difference to the children in question. We are also finding financial hardship really striking many more families, and we are receiving requests to help with even essential items like winter coats and pyjamas as families simply cannot afford these.

Our foodbank remains very well-stocked after the influx of donations at Christmas, so for those who do collect for us please note that we are only really in need of household cleaning products at the moment (washing up liquid, antibac spray etc.) Many events are now being planned over the coming months. Our Cuckmere Pilgrim path sponsored walk, which we did for the first time last year, will be returning on May 15th and we would love to have as many participants as possible.
